Guests learned of the engagement and plans for an Oct. 13 wedding from large, interlocking hearts of pink flowers suspended in the entrance hall.

Bride's Schools

Daughter of the late Mr. Pauley and niece of Edwin Pauley, the bride-to-be was graduated from Marlborough School for Girls and attended Stanford University and UCLA, where she was a member of Kappa Kappa Gamma. She was presented at the Las Madrinas Debutante Ball of 1953.

She has been active with the Debutante Guild, In-B-Tweens of the League for Crippled Children and is president of Junior Mannequin Alumnae of the Assistance League.

She is the granddaughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Pauley of San Marino and Birmingham, Ala., and of Mr. and Mrs. Valerio Tognazzini of Santa Barbara and Santa Ynez Valley.

Her fiance is the son of Frank Kennedy of New York City and Miami Beach, Fla., and the late Elizabeth Eckman Kennedy.

He is an alumnus of St. John's Military Academy, Loyola High School and UCLA, where he was a Phi Kappa Psi.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Raymond Karste of Long Beach, were seated with the wedding guests before an arbor summer house filled with greenery and white flowers and lighted with tapers in white candelabra where the handsome young couple stood before Dr. Ray J. Dollenmayer, associate pastor of Pasadena Presbyterian Church, to speak their vows.

A new moon caught in the pine tree shed its own blessing upon the scene. Luminarios lighted the bride's path and tall white gladioli blossomed at their bases to complement the all-white and moonlight-blue theme of the wedding.
