Above all, Clayton loved God and his family. He was a member of the choir and a deacon at So. Main St. Congregational Church for years, and later worshipped at Calvary Chapel in Ft. Lauderdale when in Florida. He was a totally devoted husband and father, dedicated to the provision, support, and nurturing of his family.

He was also an active member of the community, serving as a Scout Master and on the Daniel Webster Council of Boy Scouts of America for many years. He was also a member of F & A.M. Masons Washington Lodge #61, VFW, and American Legion.

Clayton was gentle, generous, thoughtful, upbeat, and had a great sense of humor. He will be missed, but not thought of with sadness, for into His hands he commended his spirit.

Clayton was predeceased by his loving wife of 48 years, Julie M. Page, on December 21, 2005. He leaves behind one son, C. Brian Page of Manchester; one daughter Julie Fontana and her husband Tony of Pompano Beach, FL; a sister Lois Henry of Bandon, OR; a sister June Saxon and her husband Lee of Eufala, AL; a grandson Michael Lacey of Pompano Beach, FL; a grandson Joel Page and his wife Sarah of Somersworth; a granddaughter Courtney Castro and her husband Nicky of Manchester; a granddaughter Tara Page of Manchester, and three great-grandchildren, Nicky, Elizabeth, and Micaiah.
