## Today Soviet Women Told They're Lovely

MOSCOW (AP)-Yelena Chukhnyuk is a Hero of Socialist Labor who likes to drive locomotives because it is "romantic."

Maria Rudenko and Tayisia Shivelova are sisters, recipients of the Order of Lenin, who "faithfully serve the motherland" as lieutenant colonels in the Soviet navy.

"These women have adult children and grandchildren, but are they not beautiful today?" asks the government newspaper Izvestia. No Russian would be rash enough to answer "No." for

today is International Women's Day in the Communist world and the Soviets' rigid observance of this holiday puts the West's Mothers Day to shame.

WHILE OFFICIALDOM praises their productivity and "development of full potential," communism's hard-working women prefer to forget about driving trucks, operating cranes and shoveling snow and he pampered by their men. It is the one day of the year when a Russian woman can expect a man to offer her his seat on crowded buses, trams

and subways. She also can expect a small gift-perfume, champagne or a colored kerchief-and a 4-ruble bunch of yellow mimosa blossoms. . "But no breakfast in bed. That is going too far," said one Muscovite family man.

Women outnumber men, 129 million to 110 million in the Soviet Union. Glorified as heroic workers in quilted coveralls, forced to fill the manpower gap left by heavy Soviet casualties in World War II, the women are proud of their equality.

But manual labor has exacted a price in a loss of femininity. Mrs. Russia is in the cellar of world beauty and fashion, and she still has more housework and less free time than the men. A RECENT SURVEY in Literaturnaya Gazeta-Literary

Gazette-showed that the average Russian woman spends 35 hours a week on household work in addition to holding down a 40-hour-a-week job. Her husband helps out, but only spends 19 hours a week on housework. A goodly portion of that 19 hours will be used up today, while the women bask in a glow of laudatory speeches, tele-

vision tributes and greetings from the Communist party Cen-"Today, all flowers are for you, my love." bannered the

weekly newspaper Nedelya. "Our dear woman workers, we men wish you the best," cooed Izvestia. "Be always such as you are now."

The Central Committee promised to continue "doing our utmost to see the Soviet women combine active production and social activities with happy motherhood and care of the family."

The women take advantage of all this attention, for to morrow it's back to the tractor and the snow plow. As locomotive driver comrade Chukhnyuk pointed out: "We women don't want to lag behind the men, now do we?"

wastes unless the discharger can prove that less treatment will meet state stream quality standards. Many other changes are em-

bodied, including a prohibition against degrading high quality streams unless social and economic necessity dictates.
