

Fr. J. C. Benke Killed In Train, Car Crash

Rev. Fr. Jacob C. Benke, 32, pastor of Christ the King Church, San Bernardino, and former assistant pastor of Our Lady of Angels Church, San Diego, was killed yesterday when his car collided with a Santa Fe freight train 4 miles southwest of Colton.

Solemn Mass of Requiem will be celebrated in the San Bernardino Church at 10 a.m. tomorrow, after which the body will be brought to San Diego. Office of the Dead will be recited at 7:45 p.m. tomorrow in St. Joseph's Cathedral, followed by recitation of the rosary.

Solemn Pontifical Mass of Requiem will be celebrated at 9:30 a.m. Saturday in the Cathedral. Burial will follow in La Jolla, Colo.

Fr. Benke, a native of Colorado Springs, received his education at St. Francis Seminary, El Cajon, and the Catholic University, Washington, D. C. He was ordained June 5, 1947, in St. Joseph's Cathedral by Most Rev. Charles Francis Buddy, D.D., bishop of the San Diego Diocese.

For 2 years, Fr. Benke served as assistant pastor of Our Lady of Angels Parish. He was transferred to the San Bernardino Parish in August, 1949. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob A. Benke, of La Jolla, and two sisters and a brother in other cities.

Roberts Asks Strong Nation

America must remain strong if it is to hold its present allies and attract others in the fight against Soviet aggression, Kent Roberts, a lecturer on international affairs, last night told members of the San Diego Dinner Club in the San Diego Club.

Roberts, speaking on "The World is Watching Us," said the people of the United States are only now beginning to understand the tremendous manpower arrayed against them by Russia and her satellites.

He reviewed recent national and international affairs, praised the State Department's "program of truth," designed to carry the story of American democracy overseas, and gave sidelights on interviews with various world leaders.

Retired Army Sergeant's Final Rites Pending

Funeral arrangements are pending at the Greenwood Mortuary for M/Sgt. William F. Hutchinson, 65, USA, ret., of 4328 Swift Ave., who died Tuesday in the Naval Hospital. A native of Illinois, he had resided in San Diego since his retirement in 1930.

Sgt. Hutchinson served 30 years in the Army and had a previous term of service with the British Army, enlisting during the Boer War.

He had foreign service in the Philippines, Mexico, France, China and Panama. He participated in four major engagements during World War I, winning a commission as a lieutenant, but re-enlisted as a sergeant after the war.

At the time of his retirement, Sgt. Hutchinson was regimental sergeant major of the Second Infantry at Fort Wayne.

Husband of Craig Rice, Mystery Writer, Freed

Paul Byron Bishop, 37, Los Angeles magazine writer and the estranged fifth husband of Craig Rice, former San Diego mystery story author, yesterday was cleared of all police charges and released from the county jail.

Bishop was arrested Oct. 2 on a vagrancy charge after being found without funds in a downtown bus depot. He said he had lost his money to a woman during an outing in Escondido. Several hours later two sleeping tablets were found in his shaving kit at city jail, and he was charged with possession of narcotics and possession of a dangerous drug.

Police dismissed the vagrancy charge but sought prosecution on the narcotic counts. Municipal Judge Ronald Abernethy dismissed the case after a letter was introduced from a Los Angeles doctor saying he had prescribed pills of that type.

Miss Rice appeared at the police station late in the day. She had been unable to find her husband since his release, but wanted to give him a transportation ticket to his home, and funds.

W.C.T.U. Asks Education to Curb Liquor

Traffic in liquor must be slowed through education and legislation, delegates to a Southern California Woman's Christian Temperance Union convention were informed here last night by Mrs. Jennie R. Thompson, president.

"We must have education that teaches what alcohol is and what it does to the human body," Mrs. Thompson said, as the 3-day meeting opened in First Baptist Church. "And we need to know what it does to society—economically and socially."

REVENUE HELD LOW

She charged that government revenue from the sale of alcoholic beverages falls far short of costs of caring for alcoholics in the nation's largest cities.

Laws to correct this situation, she said, will be enacted only when legislators are no longer blinded by the liquor interests' lobbying.

EXAMPLE OFFERED

"Official figures show that the city of Los Angeles spent in a recent year \$11,280,000 to arrest and feed drunks and try them in court," she said. "That was more than half the total cost of city government for that year."

Fire Escape Leap or Fall Kills Man

A downtown hotel resident who fell or jumped 20 feet to an F St. sidewalk from a fire escape at 12:50 p.m. yesterday, died 2 hours later in County Hospital, Deputy Coroner W. C. Davis reported. He was Martin Bryan Lash, 50.

Davis and police listed the death from head injuries as either accidental or suicide, pending investigation.

Several street repair crew members working beside the hotel, at 536 F St., reported to police that Lash had been using the fire escape during the morning to climb to the roof and watch them.

At 12:35 p.m. Lash was inside the hotel in good spirits, the hotel manager said. Lash apparently went through his window to the fire escape a little later and may have been attempting to climb to the roof when he plunged head-first to the concrete sidewalk.

Police said Lash had been drinking. Davis reported Lash was unemployed, and recently underwent an operation. The body was taken to Merkeley-Austin Mortuary.
